Acting Direction for Mood and Story

General story:

He is searching his house for all of his wife's favourite flowers, to put all of those that are left on his wife's memorial. He gets distracted at times- by dancing and humming as he used to with her??, by memories sparked by a hanging photo, by things he misses like her apple pie, he gets emotional in the middle but eventually brings the last flower to a vase next to her memorial photo frame. As though to symbolise that he is finally able to move on with that last flower, with a smile, he decides to begin fixing his broken house.

Narration on the surface = he is happy, acting like his quirky self, as he used to be. (This is shown through dialogue. Actions also show this at the start but change soon enough).

Subtext (the message underneath) = He is pretending to be okay. He is still mourning/ missing his wife, but trying to stay positive, nonetheless. (This is shown through actions and music).

Here is the important part:

I believe that this will be mostly positive, but I want to try it both ways but slower.	Tempo TBC- if it is slower or if it is the exact same as the start.	Humming at the end.
